

Today the Episcopal Community Foundation for Middle and North Georgia (ECF) announces its final 2017 Small Acts of Charity grant to Fellowship of Christians United for Service (FOCUS) for its partnership with St. Nicholas Episcopal Church (Hamilton). FOCUS will receive a grant of \$4,325 to expand their food delivery service for shut-ins in Hamilton, GA.
